The pipeline construction is planned to occur in concurrence with the City of Kennewick proposed transmission pipeline crossing of the Division IV Canal at S Irving Street. Concrete headwall modifications are anticipated to occur before the 2025 irrigation season.

An Archaeological Survey Report was completed for the Kennewick Irrigation District Title Transfer

Project. The report found no cultural resources identified within the Main Canal Division IV Canal Rightof-Way in which this project is located.

The Irving Street Siphon Improvement Project will consist of modifying an existing concrete lined canal by the installation of up to three new 48-inch diameter pipes running parallel to an existing siphon. When the Irving St crossing of the Division IV Canal was constructed, the canal was filled in and a siphon installed. The siphon was undersized causing additional headloss through the canal system. The addition of this new pipe will reduce headloss through the siphon in the location of the filled in canal. In addition to the siphon modifications, KID is planning to complete work upstream and downstream of the siphon. Upstream work will consist of installation of a new weed screen. Work will mostly occur on the uphill side canal embankment. Downstream work will consist of widening of the canal to the uphill side to match the adjacent HDPE lined canal section. See Appendix B for work extents.

The project is located within a section of the Main Canal Division IV within Kennewick, Washington. The project is located in Section 9, of Township 8 North, Range 30 East, Willamette Meridian. A map has been included to show the location of the proposed project (Appendix A).

The existing site is generally flat. Slopes are generally 0 to 15 percent.

c. What general types of soils are found on the site (for example, clay, sand, gravel, peat, muck)? If you know the classification of agricultural soils, specify them, and note any agricultural land of long-term commercial significance and whether the proposal results in removing any of these soils.

According to the US Department of Agriculture, Natural Resources Conservation Service the soils in the site are classified as Scootney Silt Loam (ScB) and Warden Silt Loam (WdB & WdD).

d. Are there surface indications or history of unstable soils in the immediate vicinity? If so, describe.

None known.

e. Describe the purpose, type, total area, and approximate quantities and total affected area of any filling, excavation, and grading proposed. Indicate source of fill.

Excavation and concrete modification will be completed to install the pipeline and to widen the canal. The depth of the excavation will vary with a minimum depth of 2.5 feet. The pipelines are approximately 100 feet in length. The upstream length of the canal that will be modified is approximately 250 feet in length. The downstream length of the canal that will be widened is approximately 240 feet in length. Excavated material will be used to fill the pipeline trench, but there will be material generated with the project due to the widening of the canal. Some 5/8 minus gravel may be imported to be used as backfill, if necessary.

f. Could erosion occur because of clearing, construction, or use? If so, generally describe.

Yes. Grading of the site could result in minor occurrences of rill erosion on bare dirt surfaces during construction, if precipitation occurs. In addition, wind erosion can occur during construction, but will be kept to a minimum through use of erosion control best management practices.

g. About what percent of the site will be covered with impervious surfaces after project construction (for example, asphalt or buildings)?

The majority of the project site within the area of the siphon will be covered with asphalt after project construction as the siphon is located under an asphalt road. The portion of the project associated with upstream and downstream work will consist of installation of impervious concrete or HDPE canal liner.

h. Proposed measures to reduce or control erosion, or other impacts to the earth, if any.

Appropriate best management practices will be employed to reduce erosion at the project site, as warranted.

<u>Fugitive dust would be expected to be present as a result of the installation activities that will occur as part of the proposed project.</u> Diesel emissions would result from construction machinery.

There are no surface water bodies in the immediate vicinity of the site, beyond man-made irrigation features (canal). The canal will eventually drain into the Columbia River.

Yes, work will occur within the constructed canal (see Appendix A). Work will consist of the addition of a siphon within the canal, as well as widening of the canal.

None. Work within the canal will be completed in an existing concrete lined section.

<u>Very minor amounts of sediments and fuel/lubricants from heavy machinery could discharge into the dewatered canal.</u> These sediments and wastes could be transported by irrigation water once irrigation season commences in spring. Best Management Practices will be used to contain all waste materials.


